Agreement with the Children

- Children all sign an 'Acceptable Use Agreement'
- This reminds them of expectations when using technology

KCSIE (Keeping Children Safe in Education)

- Refers consistently to e-safety throughout the document
- This year a major change to the document refers to the filtering and monitor of information children can access
- Effectively this refers to our management of what children can access at school
- This is managed externally by our website services – and is then reported to the school should the service deem it to have breached our agreement.

What do we do at school?

- Sessions like today
- Jigsaw (PSHE lessons)
- Digi Crew
- Child Friendly search engine (Swiggle)
- Use a Computing scheme (TeachComputing)
- Enhance our curriculum with the use of technology
- Assemblies

- Include acceptable use info reminder in the presentation
- Highlight that KCSiE has been updated to include safer online use, monitoring and filtering guidance
- Examples of how 'Teach Computing' Scheme teaches safety explicitly.
- Hints and tips for safer online use at home
- Guidance on amount of screen time for children
- Reminder of age limits for apps

Staying Safe Online



- 1 Respect other users. Be kind and polite online.



- 2 Don't share personal information.



- 3 Only talk to people you know online.



- 4 Visit safe websites that a trusted adult has checked first.



- 5 Tell a trusted adult if something makes you upset or uncomfortable.

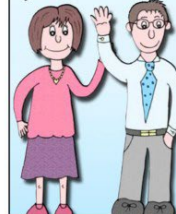

Stay Safe

Don't give out your personal information to people / places you don't know.

Don't Meet Up

Meeting someone you have only been in touch with online can be dangerous. Always check with an adult you trust.



A

Accepting Files

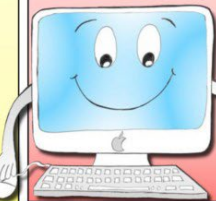
Accepting emails, files, pictures or texts from people you don't know can cause problems.



R

Reliable?

Check information before you believe it. Is the person or website telling the truth?



T

Tell Someone

Tell an adult if someone or something makes you feel worried or uncomfortable.



Outside of school – How to know what is appropriate?

- Content – what is posted / included and are there any controls to limit the type of content seen. Does a game have violent content.
- Contact – who can message them, or who are they playing games with. Can you limit this in the settings.
- In-app purchases – this can be a way of enhancing gameplay or advancing through levels. Look at the settings to turn off in-app purchases.
- Advertising – consider if the ads that are shown suitable for your child. You can report inappropriate ads to the [ASA](#).
